
This overwhelming enthusiasm suggests that seniors deeply value a space where their voices, experiences, and artistic contributions are acknowledged.



I think the next ten years will be the best decade of my life. Now retired and age 68, I have time, enough \$, and adequate physical fitness. The following photo required a long climb of 1700 feet, something I probably will not be able to do in ten years.

I enjoy solo wildlife photography in wild places. Four things I always do:

- 1) Email my wife a google map exactly where I will park the vehicle and my exact route and I never deviate from this plan.
- Carry an InReach device which allows me text messages where there is no cell service and there is an SOS emergency response button.
- Carry bear spray on my belt. I lived in Alaska for 30 years and have great respect for bears.
- 4) Hike with trekking poles. They can prevent a fall, make uphill hiking easier because the arms as well as legs are working, and make steep descents easier on the knees.

As a newbie, I began wildlife photography in June of 2024.

In October, I wanted to find some goats to photograph.

So I got to the trailhead in the dark and hiked by headlamp up to

arrive at the top of the mountain at sunrise.

I spotted 2 rocky mountain goats at eye level, but they were feeding away from me and they were in dark shadows of a northwest facing slope.

So I waited as the sun rose and moved across the sky.

Finally 4 hours later, the slope was bathed in glowing sunlight.

And the goats were now facing me at eye-level!

I made the same climb a week later, hoping to find goats, snow

but no such luck. Looking forward to trying again in early June.


Great exercise, even if I do not find goats.



Hello my fellow senior Shutterbugs, my name is Larry Heath. I bought my first camera at age 47-48, quickly I started buying bigger better cameras larger lens, shooting hand held, I soon found out about arthritis. My mother's wrist and hands were useless by age 45, I did not have a clue about her pain, at age 64, I understand. My guestion to those who have had to deal with their hands when the gear you're using is impossible to hand hold anymore. With a tripod, all is well until the unexpected shot, that to get right means moving, even the tiniest bit, the placement of the feet, and that causes you not to be able to get what you would have not missed , had your hands been able to work like they " used too". So mono pods , very handy tool, no doubt, but finding a mono pod, that is able to hold 15 lbs, that I could release the stops on the legs, without hurting my hands, and then quickly tighten those stops, tight enough to where it doesn't move. That was years and years of testing every pod I could get my hands on. But inevitably I found the same problem, shots coming from an unexpected direction, requiring any movement of the foot, was almost as frustrating as the tri pod. Pain killers are not the answer with me, liver and kidney disease and addiction, took those out of play. Has anybody come up with something that can keep old hands useable. I would love to hear how others have dealt with this, thanks for letting me bend your ear. All these shots taken in Klamath Falls Or.

New member here, definitely qualified as a senior shutterbug. I'm 79, and I've been something of a hobbyist for 50 years. I began with a 35mm Minolta SRT in 1974, a year after moving to Colorado. I shot film through the 1970's and 80's before getting married and taking a hiatus from actively pursuing photography.

In 2010 I rediscovered it with a Canon T1i DSLR and I was off again. I'm on my 4th Canon camera now, shooting with the full frame R5 mirrorless, but I spent 8 years with a crop sensor 60D. I shoot RAW and do most of my editing in Lightroom.

This is from my safari trip in 2014, and one of my favorite photographs of all that I've taken over the last 50 years (I am primarily a landscape photographer). I did have to replace the sky in Photoshop, because for much of our trip, we had very blah, hazy, flat grayish skies.



Hope its okay to share this series of some favorite pics I took this week here in South Florida.





I am enjoying all of the beautiful photos in this page. You are all so talented!






